TVA Partnership Awards STEM Grants to Copper Basin Elementary, West Fannin Elementary

he Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), in partnership with Bicentennial Volunteers Incorporated (a TVA retiree organization), recently awarded West Fannin Elementary School \$3,500 and Copper Basin Elementary School \$10,000 for STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) education projects.

The grants are among \$580,000 in competitive STEM grants presented to 161 schools across TVA's seven-state service territory. Educators submitted projects large and small, to further their STEM education initiatives in the classroom.

One of Copper Basin Elementary's projects will focus on understanding the local environment and ecosystem to best grow and maintain a viable environment. The second project is designed to provide the tools for fifth-grade science students to study the local ecosystem.

West Fannin Elementary School's project includes plans to develop a pollinator park.

The competitive grant program provided teachers an opportunity to apply for funding up to \$5,000. Preference was given to grant applications that explored TVA's primary areas of focus: environment, energy, economic and career development and community problem-solving. Schools that receive grant funding must get their power from a TVA distributor.

"The goal of the program was to help further STEM education across the valley," says Rachel Crickmar, TVA Community Relations Program Manager. "We knew this program would be popular and competitive, and now we're are looking forward to seeing the impact these projects have."

In 2013, the Tri-State EMC Operation Round Up Board decided to grant one vocational student from each of the four schools a \$500 scholarship. The

board allows each school's scholarship committee to choose the recipient.

All the money collected through Operation Round Up goes to nonprofit groups, charities and school systems in the Tri-State EMC service area. The money comes from Tri-State EMC members who round their bill up to the next dollar. Once a month, the Tri-State EMC Foundation board considers grant requests and distributes the money.
